> <u>CC2: History of Bengali Society, Culture and Literature</u>

CO 1: The paper is about the Knowledge of Bengali pre-modern society, culture and history.

> <u>CC 8 : Pre-Modern Bengali Literature</u>

CO 1:The course learns about the some selected texts of Pre-Modern Bengali Literature.

CC 9 : Bengali Novel

CO 1: To provide learners a deep insight about Bengali novels with three texts.

Semester – 3

> <u>CC 10 Tagore's Literature</u>

CO 1: This course aims to capture a slice of the experience on Tagore's Short stories, Essays and Drama.

> <u>CC 11 Bengali Short Stories</u>

CO 1:Initial Idea of 20th Century modernity through short stories of modern masters.

- Idea of Naturalism, Realism, and experimental narrative styles in modernist discourse

> <u>CC 12 : Tagore's Literature</u>

CO 1: An intimate study of Tagore's poetic genius and its evolution.
