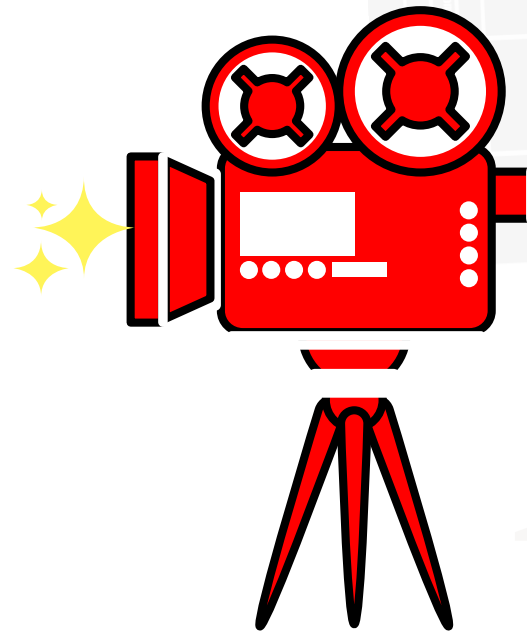
Cultural Club

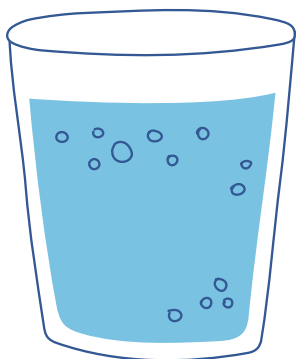
Film & Drama Club

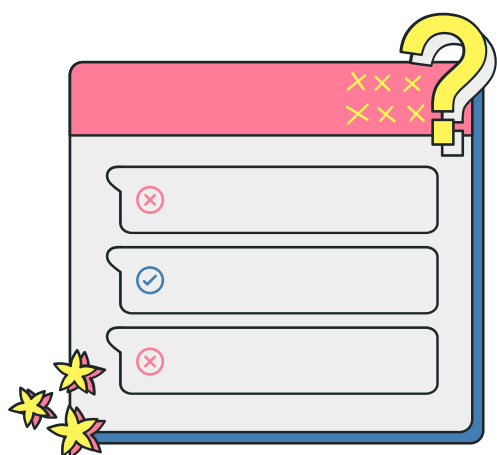
Science & Environment Club

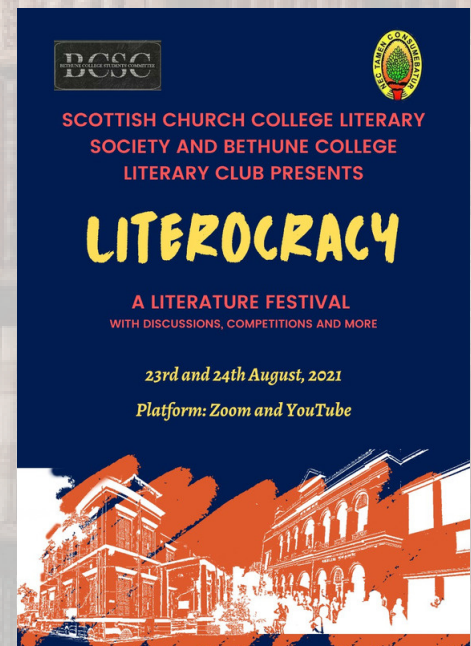

Texas boy Jean on a 'race to kindness', collected 120,000 books for kids across the state.

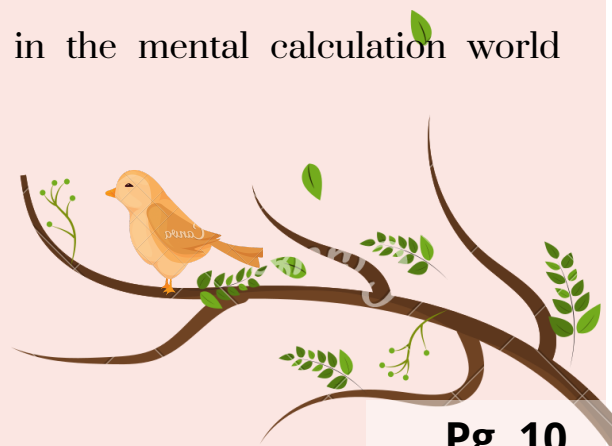
17-year-old Indian-origin player Samir Banerjee wins the Wimbledon boys' singles title.

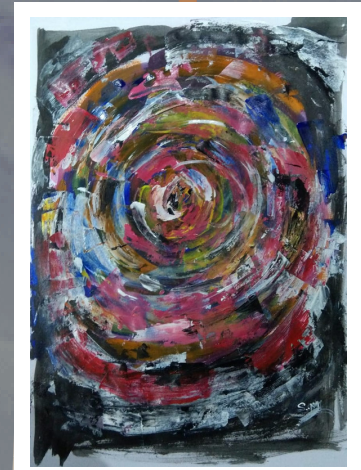

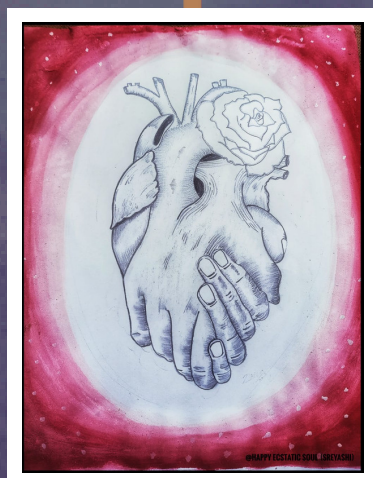

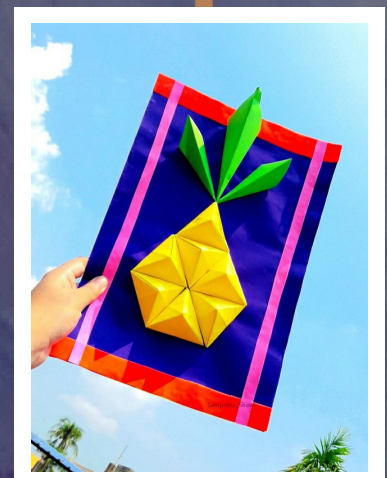

SOPHIA

In October 2017, Sophia became a Saudi Arabian citizen, the first robot to receive citizenship of any country. In November 2017, Sophia was named the United Nations Development Programme's first ever innovation Champion, and is the first non-human to be given any United Nation title. It was developed by Hanson Robotics and activated on February 14, 2016

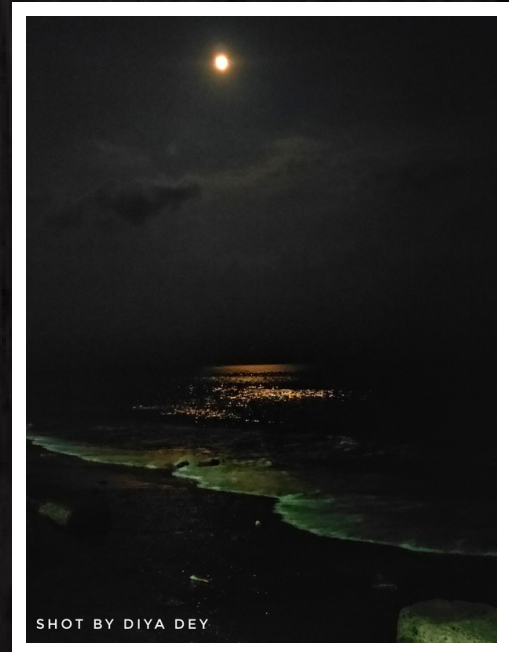

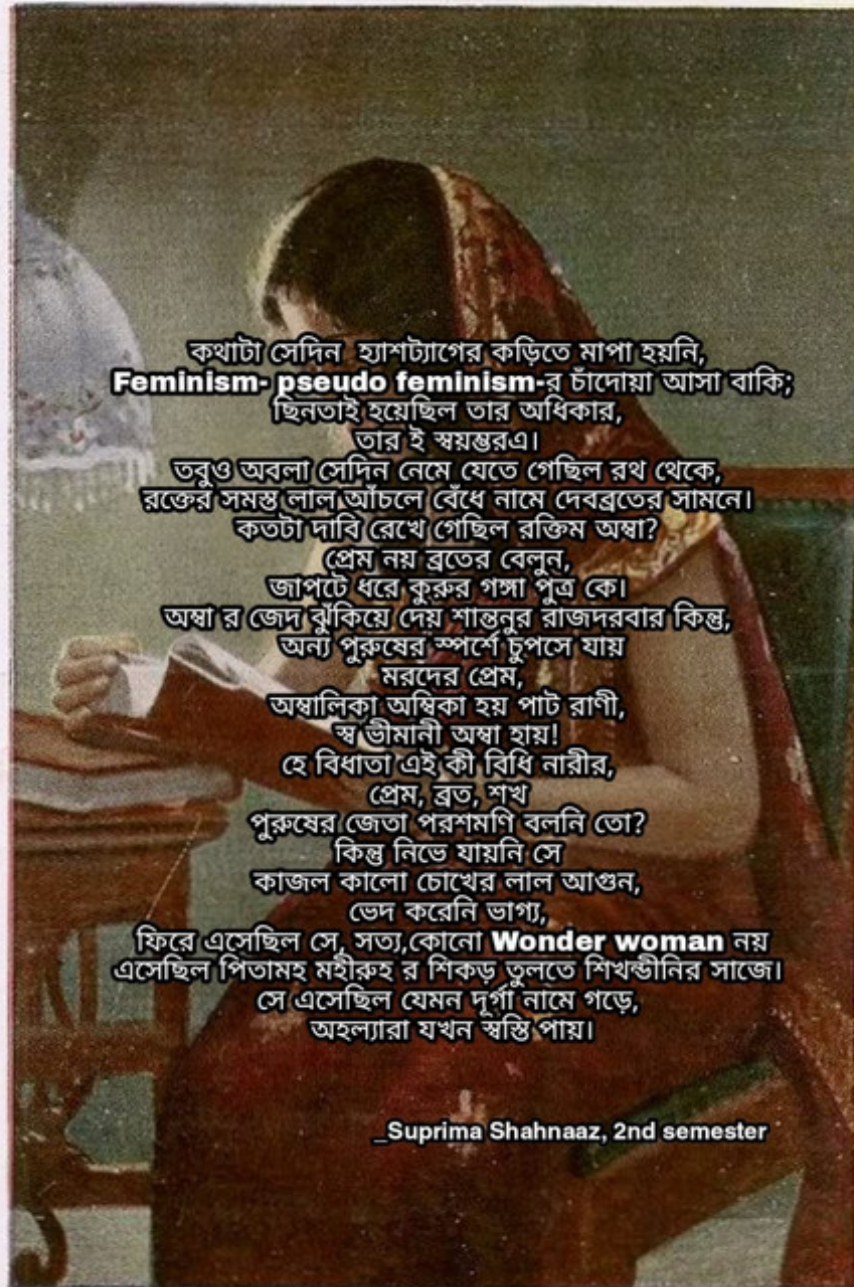
